The Starr Charitable Foundation Scholarship was set up by an anonymous donor to give high school seniors in Wyoming or the Upper Peninsula an opportunity to go to Michigan State free for eight semesters. It includes all basic costs along with books, and room and board. To be able to receive this type of scholarship the recipient must be an outstanding student, demonstrate ambitious, talented, and enthusiastic characteristics, show leadership traits, and also have extraordinary skills that distinguish them from their peers. Along with needing to meet all of these expectations the person has to go through a difficult application process that includes writing four essays, and getting interviewed if you are selected.

This year, the winner of the Starr Scholarship is Willard Bal. He is the only student from Hancock High school to ever win this specific scholarship. Willard is a great student and has participated in many school activities like SLACK, Interact, and football.

To prepare for applying for this scholarship Willard got involved in as much as he could, and made sure to practice answering questions before his interview.
